President's Message

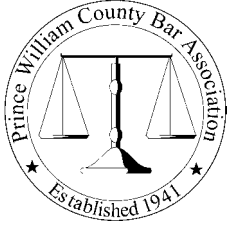
Happily, Spring has finally sprung and the city is in bloom! The month between the April showers and May flowers was an eventful one for the PWBCA. First, we were most fortunate to host our legislative delegation at the April luncheon meeting. The response by the legislators was overwhelming, with three senators and four delegates accepting our invitation despite the marathon legislative sessions many of them had just concluded. Senators Colgan, Puller and O'Brien, together with Delegates Parrish, Marshall, McQuigg and Lingamfelter addressed a capacity crowd on many of the controversial issues facing the General Assembly ranging from budget cuts and estate taxes to term limits and judicial selection. The delegation also provided interesting insight into behind-the-scenes debates, thought patterns, and why individual legislators voted as they did. We are most grateful to the delegation for their kind participation in this timely and educational event.

In keeping with our goal of providing more information, benefits and services to our members, the May lunch meeting will combine CLE credit with technology topics relevant to every practitioner. We are particularly pleased to present John W. Simek, Vice-President of Sensei Enterprises, Inc., to conduct a program on law office technology and computer forensics. Topics will include an overview of software available for office, case, conflict and account management, as well as litigation practice information concerning the discovery and use of electronic evidence. This program is sure to have something for everyone.

On another subject relating to lunch meetings, we announced at the April meeting that member price for the luncheons will increase to \$7.00 as of the May meeting. While we did not receive many comments in response to the announcement, the comments I did receive suggest that some members have questions and/or differing understandings about what we are paying for and why. Accordingly, I am using this column to explain in order to reach all of you who may have similar questions.

Prior to the increase, we were paying \$10.00 per person based on the number actually attending. Of that amount the bar paid \$5.00 and the member paid \$5.00. The Bar was also paying a flat room/service fee, primarily to compensate the wait staff. After experiencing this arrangement for a few months, the new management of Jake's advised the Bar that they were losing money and could not continue. One large problem was that actual attendance was often less than the RSVP number, so that they were preparing for a larger crowd and not being compensated for it. Also, Jake's was providing a higher quality menu. Finally, no provision had been made for sales tax. The Executive Committee considered the issues presented by Jake's and found them to be legitimate business concerns. Accordingly, I personally met with the new owner of Jake's for the purpose of working out a mutually beneficial arrangement. Under the new arrangement, the price of lunch per person will increase from \$10.00 to \$12.00 plus tax (approx. \$1.00) based on confirmed attendance (i.e. the RSVP number called in – therefore, it is important that everyone RSVP). Of that amount

the bar will increase its subsidy to \$6.00 and the member portion will increase to \$7.00. In consideration of the price increase, Jake's will not charge the additional flat service charge and will also provide a 20% overage allowance built into the price to accommodate walk ins (i.e. if we call in 40, they will make enough for 48 without charging extra). It should also be remembered that the per person charge includes more than lunch in that we also receive exclusive use of the facility and the PA system (which many other establishments do not have). The new arrangement was unanimously approved by the Board as a fair and reasonable accommodation on both sides. Of course, the Board remains committed to providing you with the best deal possible. To that end, if anyone believes they have a better solution, we will be happy to consider any other written proposal submitted. I hope that this explanation adequately answers any questions and I look forward to seeing you all at the May luncheon meeting.

I am also looking forward to working with you all on our annual Law Day program coming up in May, the ever popular "So You're 18" presentations to our high school seniors.

Report from Bar Council

What is the Virginia State Bar Council, and what does it do?

I find in discussions with members of the PWCBA that they are often unclear as to how the State Bar functions, and indeed on exactly what the State Bar Council is and what it does.

Attorneys in Virginia enjoy the privilege of self-governance. This is not true in many state bars around the country. Our State Bar's governing body is called the State Bar Council, which is comprised of elected representatives from all the judicial circuits, plus some at-large representatives appointed by the Supreme Court. The State Bar Council meets three times a year to debate such things as disciplinary and ethics rules changes (which originate in the Council but must be approved by the Supreme Court), state bar dues, committee structure and function, and state bar policy.

Much of the State Bar's work is done in committees. There are committees devoted to Continuing Legal Education, Ethics, Unauthorized Practice of Law, Budget and Audit, and Lawyer Discipline, to name but a few. These committees, like the Bar Council itself, are staffed by volunteers from all over the state. I would encourage any member who has an interest in a specialty area to join the State Bar's committee in that area. It is an excellent way to have input into that area, as well as to meet colleagues with like interests.

ANLIR, Judicial Independence

The most recent Bar Council meeting was dominated by discussion of the same topic appearing in Lawyers Weekly and other legal publications: the apparent collapse of ANLIR. The State Bar Council's decision two years ago to drop ANLIR as the Bar's recommended agency looked good in hindsight, but this does not help the many Virginia attorneys who remain insured through ANLIR. The recommendation of those who spoke on the topic: If you haven't done so already, get replacement coverage, and be sure this coverage includes coverage for events prior to the policy period, as there is no guarantee ANLIR will ever pay any claims.

Judicial independence is a topic of which we are reminded when it suddenly appears endangered, as occurred during the recent General Assembly session, when a number of judges were questioned on apparently political issues. A very good discussion of the issues involved, and of where Virginia's judicial selection and retention process fits within quite varied methods used throughout the country, can be found in the Law Library, where I have left several copies.

“**Co-mingled” custody and VISITATION orders.** Judge Gluchowski asked the Board to remind Bar members that only one order is necessary for custody and VISITATION of a child, rather than separate orders for custody and VISITATION. While an order should be submitted for each child in a case, one order can be entered for each child addressing both custody and VISITATION.

Support orders should be filed separately.

Treasurer Craig Johnston reported on the status of deposits and monies collected from the 2003 Silent Auction.

The Beat the Odds® banquet will receive \$15,100 from the PWCBF. This amount could increase subject to the net cost of the banquet. There were three scholarship donations--one from Friends of Ric Perez (\$2100), one from Park West Lions Club (\$2300) and one from Farrell & Croft, PC (\$2500). Bankruptcy Section Update

Attorney Fees - Hard work down the drain? I am frequently asked by non-bankruptcy Attorneys, "How can a client run up my bill, and then discharge their debt to me in bankruptcy?" It seems impossible, but it is easy to do. So, I recommend you look closely at a potential client's assets and ability to pay before you go out on the financial limb for them. The fact that your potential client owns a home with equity with a spouse, is no help unless you have the spouse sign your retainer. Tenants by the Entirety Property cannot be touched if you only have one spouse on the retainer. If you think you will fight in Bankruptcy Court to make the client pay, think again. It's an expensive and frequently unrewarding process. Despite all the news coverage regarding Bankruptcy Law modifications, essentially none have been enacted. So, even with a high income, it is still possible to discharge debts. Depending upon a person's monthly debt service, annual incomes of up to \$60,000.00 would not necessarily be ruled out of receiving a discharge. Domestic Relations Attorneys should know that pursuant to 11 U.S.C. § 523 a. (5), obligations to a spouse of alimony, maintenance and support, whether by agreement or Court Decree are non-dischargeable. Even more crucial to the payment of your fees, obligations ancillary to support, such as Attorney fees may not be discharged either, if they are found to be "... in the nature of alimony, maintenance or support." What this means is subject to debate depending on the facts and circumstances of each case, but I would recommend inserting into your Agreements and Decrees language that expressly states that the parties agree that all obligations are considered in the nature of alimony, maintenance or support, and are therefore non-dischargeable in bankruptcy;...and hope this works. Good Luck collecting your fees!
