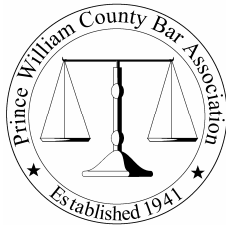

General District Court Update

During the monthly meeting with the supervising clerks, it was discussed that on several occasions an attorney who has negotiated a traffic school disposition without the client being there, has neglected to pick up the traffic school disposition form, which details what the client must do to have the case dismissed or otherwise disposed of. This may result in nonperformance of the requirements and a conviction for the client.

OCRA Coming to Circuit Court September 28

Officer of the Court Remote Access (OCRA) will be available to all members of the Virginia State Bar beginning (tentatively) September 28. Subscribers will have inquiry only access to currently scanned Prince William Circuit Court case documents in the Case Imaging System, except for juvenile, adoption, and sealed cases as well as those parts of a file that are marked confidential, restricted, sealed, private addendum or victim/witness.

By September 10, the subscriber agreement should be available at www.pwcgov.org/ccourt. Click on Access to Online Records/Attorney Remote Access. Once completed and returned to the Circuit Court Clerk's Office, a username and password will be issued.

Per Virginia Code attorneys can access only their own cases. By agreement, support staff will not be able to use the password or access the database.

The service will be free at least for a while until the Supreme Court of Virginia requires the Clerk's Office to pay another fee for the service. Hopefully, legislation will be introduced next year to enable support staff directly supervised by a member of the Virginia State Bar to use the system.

Criminal Law Legislative Updates


Code Section 18.2-32.3:

Human infant; independent and separate existence. Provides that for the purposes of homicide, the fact that the umbilical cord has not been cut or that the placenta remains attached shall not be considered in determining whether a human infant has achieved an independent and separate existence. The bill has an emergency clause. This bill is identical to SB 602.

Code Section 18.2-46.3:3:

Gang-free zones; penalties. Expands current "gang-free school zones" to the broader "gang-free zones" and includes any publicly owned or operated community center or recreational center. Engaging in criminal street gang activity in a gang-free zone is a Class 5 or 6 felony and may include a two-year mandatory minimum sentence, depending upon other aggravators.

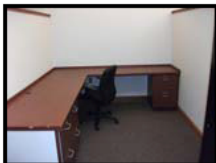
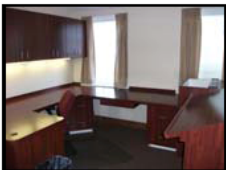

Criminal Law Legislative Updates, Continued

Code Section 16.1-241 and Section 18.2-370.5:

Sex offenses prohibiting entry onto school property. Provides that a sex offender who has received a court order allowing entry on school or child day center property must also obtain permission of the school board or of the owner of the private school or child day center for entry with all or part of the scope of the lifted ban and must do so in compliance with the terms and conditions of both the school or center and the court order. The bill also provides that the petition must be filed in circuit court; current law allows an adult who is prohibited from entering upon school or child day center property because he was convicted of a sexually violent offense to petition either the juvenile and domestic relation district or circuit court of the locality for permission to enter the property.

Code Section 18.2-308:

Possession of concealed weapons in vehicles. Creates a new exemption to the general prohibition against carrying concealed weapons by allowing a person who may lawfully possess a firearm to carry a handgun in a private motor vehicle or vessel if the handgun is secured in a container or compartment.

Code Section 18.2-271:

Consecutive license suspensions for DUI. Provides that any suspension of driving while intoxicated shall run consecutively with any other court-ordered period of suspension for driving while intoxicated or for underage driving with a blood alcohol concentration of 0.02 percent or more. Currently, suspension ordered for failure to submit to a blood or breath test run consecutively with the DUI suspension.

Criminal Law Legislative Updates, Continued

Code Section 18.2-59:

Extortion; definition of injury to property. Provides that for the purposes of the extortion statute “injury to property” includes the sale, distribution or release of personal identifying information listed in the identity theft statute, unless it is done with the intent to obtain money, property, or a pecuniary benefit to which a person reasonably believes he is lawfully entitled.

Code Section 18.2-427:

Use of profane, threatening, or indecent language over public airways or by computer or text. Provides that any person who uses obscene, vulgar, profane, lewd, lascivious, or indecent language, or makes any suggestion or proposal of an obscene nature, or threatens any illegal or immoral act with the intent to coerce, intimidate, or harass any person when any electronically transmitted message is received or transmitted by telephone is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. Current law punishes such behavior when simply using a telephone or citizens band radio.

Code Section 18.2-31:

Capital murder; fire marshals, deputy and assistant fire marshals; penalty. Adds fire marshals and deputy and assistant fire marshals with law-enforcement powers to the capital murder statute so that the death sentence can be imposed for their murder when such killing is for the purpose of interfering with the performance of their official duties.

Code Section 46.2-398.1:

Restricted driving privilege for out-of-state drivers. Provides that when the driver of any motor vehicle not licensed to drive in Virginia, but who has a valid driver’s license from another jurisdiction, is convicted in Virginia of a violation for which license suspension and issuance of a restricted license is authorized, the court may issue a restricted driving privilege in Virginia upon the same condition as if the person held a valid Virginia license.

Code Section 46.2-857:

Vehicles driving abreast. Provided that the prohibition on vehicles driving abreast does not apply to vehicles lawfully overtaking and passing vehicles traveling in the same direction in a separate lane.

Criminal Law Legislative Updates, continued

Code Section 46.2-301.1:

Administrative impoundment of motor vehicles. Provides for a three-day administrative impoundment of a motor vehicle when driving without an operator's license if the person has previously been convicted of driving without a license. A person who knowingly authorizes the operation of a motor vehicle by a person who he knows has no operator's license and who he knows has been previously convicted of driving without a license is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. The provisions of the bill do not apply to a person whose license has been expired for less than one year prior to the offense or a person under 18 years of age at the time of the offense.

Code Section 46.2-1216:

Parking violations. Adds Prince William County to existing provisions that grant certain localities authority to provide by ordinance that whenever any motor vehicle against which there are three or more outstanding unpaid or otherwise unsettled parking violation notices found parked upon private property, the vehicle may be removed or immobilized. The county previously had the authority granted under this provision but was inadvertently omitted from the rewrite of this section in 2007 by a bill that sought to replace locality descriptions with locality names. This bill incorporates HB298 and HB 492.

Code Section 46.2-921.1:

"Move over" law. Requires drivers to move to the left on a four lane highway when approaching vehicles displaying flashing blue, red, or amber lights. The offense is punished as a traffic infraction, formerly a Class 1 misdemeanor. A second or subsequent violation, when such violation involved a vehicle with flashing, blinking, or alternative blue or red lights, is punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor. These provisions shall not apply in highway work zones. This bill incorporates HB 403.

Code Section 46.2-2059.1:

Roof signs and marking for taxicabs. Every motor vehicle operating in the Commonwealth as a taxicab or performing a taxicab service shall bear a roof sign and markings, permanently affixed to its exterior, in letters at least three inches in height identifying the vehicle as a taxicab.

Code Section 46.2-817:

Eluding police; penalty. Provides that a person who attempts to escape or elude a law-enforcement officer who has given a signal to bring the motor vehicle to a stop is guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor whether the attempt to escape or elude is on foot, in the motor vehicle or by any other means.

Code Section 16.1-278.9:

Punishment of a juvenile for possession, etc., of alcohol. Provides that a juvenile charged with possession, consumption, etc., of alcohol or public intoxication may be found delinquent of such a charge and punished, or have his case deferred and upon completion of the terms and conditions of his probation, have his case dismissed by the juvenile and domestic relations district court. Current law provides that the case shall be deferred and shall be dismissed upon completion of the terms and conditions.

Code Section 16.1-278.9:

Delinquent children; loss of driving privileges. Eliminates the authority of the court to give a restricted driver's permit, for travel to and from home to school when school-provided transportation is available, to a child who has lost his driving privilege for certain offenses, including alcohol, firearm, and truancy offenses.

Code Section 16.1-278.9:

Punishment for delinquent acts. Provides that for a second or subsequent offense of underage possession of alcohol, public intoxication, or possession of a handgun or streetsweeper shotgun, the charges against a juvenile shall not be dismissed upon completion of terms and conditions, but must be disposed of according to 16.1-278.8, which allows multiple dispositional option.

Code Section 18.2-266.1 (REMINDER):

Persons under age 21 driving after illegally consuming alcohol. The provision for forfeiture of a convicted person's license to operate a motor vehicle was reduced from one year from the date of conviction to six months from the date of conviction. All other provisions remain the same. This amendment was made in the 2009 Legislative Session, but took effect July 1, 2010.

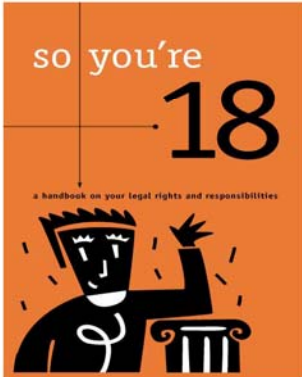
